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All 'Turkey'd' Out?

By the time you get to the end of December, you could be forgiven, perhaps, for feeling filled to the brim with Turkey and all the inevitable trimmings that go with it, but it's always good to leave a little space for New Year's

Although, because of timelines, the actual day happens at varying times throughout the world, New Year's Eve (also known as Old Year's Day in many countries) is something that is celebrated in most countries. Tonga and Kiritimati (Christmas Island), part of Kiribati, are examples of the first places to welcome the New Year while Baker Island in the United States of America is among the last.

Celebration is always the theme, although methods and styles differ with social get together's, parties, fireworks and religious services being popular; all taking place depending on culture and customs. The celebrations generally go on past midnight into New Year's Day.

And then there are New Year's Resolutions which are a promise, or indeed promises on the first day of the new year that you make to yourself to start doing something good, or stop doing something bad, or both.



The ancient Babylonians are said to have been the first people to make New Year's resolutions, some 4.000 years ago. They were also the first to hold recorded celebrations in honour of the new year. During a massive 12-day religious festival, they made promises to the gods to pay their debts and return any objects they had borrowed. These promises could be considered the forerunners of our New Year's resolutions. If the Babylonians kept to their word, their (pagan) gods would bestow favour on them for the coming year. If not, they would fall out of the gods' favour - a place no one wanted to be. As time went by, it seems that for early Christians, the first day of the new year became the traditional occasion for thinking about one's past mistakes and resolving to do and be better in the future.

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religious roots, these days, instead of making promises to the gods, New Year's resolutions tend to be people making resolutions to themselves. 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Local Update

Help for Wildlife
Hornbeam Wood Hedgehog Sanctuary is set
in about 10 Acres of woodlands, fields, and hedgerows, with special pens and gardens for the hedgehogs which are protected to avoid any harm or disruption from people.

The Sanctuary is based in Harpenden/ Wheathampstead and located on the same lands that made up Grahame Dangerfield's Animal Sanctuary and still uses many of the original pens and cages. The sanctuary is home to all kinds of local wildlife including barn owls, bats, deer, foxes, hedgehogs, rabbits and more.

The family run local charity was established in 2015 by Martin and Harriet who, with help from the local community, are involved on a daily basis, currently rehabilitating up to 70 hedgehogs



at any one time. Whilst looking after sick and injured Hedgehogs is probably a full-on labour of love for the mother and son team that run the Hornbeam Wood Hedgehog Sanctuary, they are always looking for ways to improve what the sanctuary has to offer.

At the moment they are planning on creating a new wildlife pond which would provide homes to a range of animals including newts, frogs, toads, dragonflies and many other invertebrates. Martin told us: "We have decided to look for funding for the new wildlife pond via Crowdfunding. Any amount that people can donate will be a great help. If we can reach £5,000 then Hertfordshire County Council will also match fund £2,500."

Unmistakeable Yo Ho Ho!

The festive season is upon us and what better ■ way to enjoy all that it has to offer than by exploring some of the Area's best Christmas markets? Over recent years, I've been pleased to note that Hertfordshire is home to some incredible Christmas markets, selling lots of unusual festive gifts and delicious food and drink. It's worth noting too that our regular weekly or monthly markets tend to get extra 'christmassy' during the month of December, so they are worth



a visit too.

Usually, just wandering around the stalls in a market at this time of year can be an uplifting experience, because there's often twinkling lights, mulled wine, a festive atmosphere and fantastic gifts. Sometimes, you could even catch the unmistakeable Yo Ho Ho from that famous chap in red Mr S Claus - if you are lucky that is! However, these days, according to the media, we are spending more time and money on the internet than ever before, so we checked out some statistics supplied by experts, Statista. Apparently, in the UK, over 80 percent of the population makes e-commerce purchases, or to put it in other words, over four in five UK consumers are digital buyers. Over the last couple of decades, online shopping has become common place in the UK and, indeed, around the world, and the numbers are still growing. By 2025, for example, the penetration rate among the country's consumers is expected to reach a projected 90 percent.

Around six in ten British digital shoppers had purchased at least one item of clothing in the past 12 months. While clothes Continued on page 18

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and footwear were the most popular categories, shoppers liked buying several kinds of products, including electronics, food and drinks, cosmetics, furniture and more. Before buying anything, however, more than half of UK consumers would do some research on the internet first. Many also found reading customer reviews very helpful. In fact, over 90 percent of consumers in the UK stated that they typically avoided buying from a business below a 4-star rating, making it vital for e-retailers to provide quality products and customer-friendly service.

Pandemic Influence

Given that the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has had a strong impact on the daily lives of individuals, it comes as no surprise that it also influenced their shopping behaviour. When asked whether the crisis had caused them to buy more, less, or the same amount online, roughly 70 percent of British respondents stated that their online purchases had increased compared to before the pandemic. This increase in shopping online applied to several industries, including the food retail sector. In fact, the share of food retail sales made online in Britain had doubled and remained relatively stable since the first lockdowns. In that vein, a considerable share of surveyed shoppers in the UK believed they would continue shopping for food and groceries online,

even after COVID-19 subsides.

It's interesting reading, and I suppose the convenience of it all dictates that most of us will buy at least some things using the internet. Honestly though, I'm still not convinced that anything online can beat browsing around a good Christmas market.

Wheathampstead Memorial Hall with a cheese and wine evening attended by 40 people. All the food was bought from local shops.

It was 2002 when BBC local news published an article which highlighted the so called 'fading grandeur' of Wheathampstead. The Liberal Democrat district councillor at the time was Chris Oxley and he said: "Unless the local community, including the local authority, takes firm action to stem the slide, then I fear Wheathampstead and many other villages will continue to become more and more like ghost villages."

Fortunately, local man Barry Levison took up the challenge and. working with Wheathampstead Parish Council, he formed an Enterprise Committee and then Wheathampstead for Enterprising Business (WEB) was formed, effectively a trade association for local business who wanted to support each other to ensure that the ghost village predictions did not come true. 20 years on, Wheathampstead High Street is completely different and is a vibrant village destination for local people and local families, as well as visitors to the area who can all enjoy our various shops, cafes, restaurants and pubs. 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Bone Health Does it Matter?

Our bones support us and allow us to move. They protect our brain, heart, and other organs from injury. Our bones also store minerals such as calcium and phosphorous, which help keep our bones strong, and release them into the body when we need them for other uses.

There are many things we can do to keep our bones healthy and strong. Eating foods rich in calcium and vitamin D, getting plenty of exercise, and having good health habits help keep our bones healthy.

But if we don't eat right and don't get enough of the right kinds of exercise, our bones can become weak and even break. Broken bones (called fractures) can be painful and sometimes need surgery to heal. They can also cause long-lasting health problems.

But the good news is that it is never too late to take care of your bone.

What Can I Do to Make My Bones Healthier?

It is never too early or too late to take care of your bones. The following steps can help you



improve your bone health:

Eat a well-balanced diet rich in calcium and vitamin D. Good sources of calcium include low-fat dairy products and foods and drinks with added calcium. Good sources of vitamin D include egg yolks, saltwater fish, liver, and milk with vitamin D. Some people may need to take nutritional supplements in order to get enough calcium and vitamin D. Fruits and vegetables also contribute other nutrients that are important for bone health.

Get plenty of physical activity. Like muscles, bones become stronger with exercise. The best exercises for healthy bones are strength-building and weight-bearing, like walking, climbing stairs, lifting weights, and dancing. Try to get 30 minutes of exercise each day.

Live a healthy lifestyle. Don't smoke and, if you choose to drink alcohol, don't drink too much. Talk to your doctor about your bone health. Go over your risk factors with your doctor and ask if you should get a bone density test. If you need it, your doctor can order medicine to help prevent bone loss and reduce your chances of breaking a bone.

Prevent falls. Falling down can cause a bone to

break, especially in someone with osteoporosis. But most falls can be prevented. Check your home for dangers like loose rugs and poor lighting. Have your vision checked. Increase your balance and strength by walking every day and taking classes like Tai Chi and Yoga,

Osteoporosis

Osteoporosis is a condition that weakens bones, making them fragile and more likely to break. It develops slowly over several years and is often only diagnosed when a minor fall or sudden impact causes a bone fracture.

The most common injuries in people with osteoporosis are wrist and hip fractures or fractures of the spinal bones (vertebrae). However, they can also occur in other bones, such as in the arm or pelvis. Sometimes a cough or sneeze can cause a rib fracture or the partial collapse of one of the bones of the spine. Osteoporosis isn't usually painful until a fracture occurs, but spinal fractures are a common cause of long-term pain.

Although a fracture is the first sign of osteoporosis, some older people develop the characteristic stooped *Continued on page 25*

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(bent forward) posture. It happens when the bones in the spine have fractured, making it difficult to support the weight of the body.

Who's affected?

Osteoporosis affects over three million people in the UK.

More than 500,000 people receive hospital treatment for fragility fractures every year as a result of osteoporosis.

Causes of osteoporosis

Losing bone is a normal part of the ageing process, but some people lose bone density much faster than normal. This can lead to osteoporosis and an increased risk of fractures.

Women also lose bone rapidly in the first few years after the menopause. Women are more at risk of osteoporosis than men, particularly if the menopause begins early (before the age of 45). Many other factors can also increase the risk of developing osteoporosis, including:

- long-term use of high-dose oral corticosteroids
- other medical conditions such as inflammatory conditions,
- hormone-related conditions, or malabsorption problems
- a family history of osteoporosis particularly history of a hip fracture in a parent
- long-term use of certain medications which can affect bone strength or hormone levels
- having a low body mass index (BMI)

Will I Need to Take Medicine for My Bones?

There are medicines to help prevent and treat osteoporosis. Your doctor may want you to take medicine if your bone density test shows that

your bones are weak and that you have a good chance of breaking a bone in the future. Your doctor is more likely to order medicine if you have other health concerns that increase your risk for breaking a bone, such as a tendency to fall or a low body weight.
